## Denver Recycles is Hungry for More! Now Accepting Mixed Plastics



Denver Recycles wants more of your plastics! In April 2011, the recycling program began accepting all **rigid plastic containers marked with a number 1 through 7** on them. The quantities have been increasing, but we know you have more plastics in your homes that could be recycled.

While it is exciting that we can recycle more, it remains very important that recycling participants pay close attention to our guidelines about what is and is not accepted, as not all plastics can be recycled.

Denver Recycles accepts rigid plastic bottles, jugs, jars, tubs, cups, trays and containers marked with a number 1 through 7 in the recycling symbol. Remember, containers should be empty and lids removed when possible.

## Examples of ACCEPTABLE plastics are:

- Soda, water, shampoo and soap bottles
- Milk, laundry detergent and cat litter jugs
- Yogurt, sour cream, cottage cheese and butter tubs
- Peanut butter and mayonnaise jars
- 5 "To-go" or "take out" plastic drinking cups
- Plastic trays like those used for microwave dinners
- "Clam-Shell" containers like those used to package strawberries, blueberries and bakery goods
- Plastic containers like those used to package salad mixes

#### Plastics NOT ACCEPTED include:

NO plastic bags; Styrofoam® packaging like cups and meat trays; shrink wrap; toys; plastic tubes; containers larger than 3 gallons; and, containers marked as "PLA," compostable or made from plant based materials.

## Setting Out Branches and Yard Waste

Follow These Guidelines When Setting Out Branches and Yard Waste:

- Tie loose branches in bundles no longer than 4 feet in length and weighing no more than 50 pounds. No branches may exceed 4 inches in diameter.
- No sod or dirt.
- Leaves and yard clippings
  must be in bags or containers,
  and must not weigh more
  than 50 pounds each. Find out

#### **BARREL SERVICE CUSTOMERS**

- A maximum of 10 branch bundles per household will be collected per overflow collection cycle (every 3 weeks).
- Do <u>not</u> place branches in your City-issued black barrel.
- Place branches at least 4 feet away from your barrel or recycling cart.

#### **MANUAL SERVICE CUSTOMERS**

 A maximum of 10 items including trash bags, containers and branch bundles per household will be collected each week.




#### **DUMPSTER SERVICE CUSTOMERS**

- A maximum of 5 branch bundles can be placed in a dumpster per week. If the dumpsters already have branches, please hold yours over until the next week.
- Excess branches or bagged yard debris may be set out on your scheduled Large Item Pickup (LIP) week.
- Do <u>not</u> place items within 4 feet of the dumpsters.

If you need help with your branches, Denver Forestry maintains a list of licensed tree contractors who can help with your tree care needs and many offer branch removal services. A list can be found at DenverGov.org/Forestry.

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9 = LIP areas



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## **Learn How To Handle Your Overflow Trash – Don't Get Left Holding The Bag**



- Overflow trash is collected once every three(3) weeks.
- During your scheduled overflow collection week, your overflow trash must be set out by 7 AM on your normal trash collection day.
- Only trash inside the black barrel is collected weekly. Overflow trash is any material left outside of your City-issued black trash barrel.
- Trash should not be stored at the curb on non-collection days. Store your overflow trash on your property, out of public view, until your scheduled collection day.

- Trash should <u>not</u> be set out in cardboard boxes.
- Maximum of 10 bags will be collected per overflow collection cycle (every 3 weeks) per household.
- Use your barrel to full capacity. Heavy items should be placed in the bottom, the lid may be open to a 45 degree angle and trash must not be placed on top of the lid.

## Taking Care of the Dumpster in Your Alley

Almost half of Denver homes receive trash collection service through shared dumpsters in the alley. Since the dumpsters are a shared resource, it is the responsibility of all the neighbors on the block to take care of the dumpsters and surrounding area in their alley. While dumpsters can be convenient for residents to use, if they are not properly cared for problems can arise. There are some basic dumpster usage and care guidelines you should follow:

- Keep Your Eyes Open: About 80 percent of illegal dumping in Denver occurs in alleys with dumpsters. If you see illegal dumping taking place in your alley, try to write down the license plate number and report it to us by calling 311.
   Please do not confront illegal dumpers.
- Keep Liquids & HHW Out: Never put liquids, electronics or household hazardous waste (paint, chemicals, fluorescent bulbs, etc.) in dumpsters. These items can cause significant health, safety and environmental concerns if they spill or leak out of dumpsters.

- Bag All Your Trash: Loose trash can cause litter in your alley when dumpsters are emptied.
- Close Dumpster Lids: Rodents and wind can cause litter when dumpster lids are left open. If your neighbors aren't the best at closing lids, help everyone out by closing the lids yourself.
- Pick Up Litter: Take a turn picking up litter in and around the dumpsters in your alley. If everyone pitches in a little, your alley will stay clean.
- Leave Clearance Space: Do <u>not</u> place items up against dumpsters or leave items around the outside of dumpsters, as they may prevent the dumpster from being emptied and may attract illegal dumping. Recycling carts and large items should be set at least 4 feet away from dumpsters.



- Remove Graffiti: Contact Denver Partners
   Against Graffiti about removing graffiti from
   dumpsters in your alley, or get free paint supplies
   to remove the graffiti yourself.
- Report Damage: Call 311 to report damaged dumpsters. For example, missing or broken dumpster lids or rusted dumpster bottoms.
- Recycle: In Denver, dumpster service customers produce about 30 percent more trash than other service types. Reduce your waste by signing up for Denver Recycles FREE recycling program by calling 311 or visiting DenverGov.org/DenverRecycles.

## Proper Set Out Guidelines

Whether you are setting out your purple recycling cart, black trash barrel or trash bags, there are specific guidelines that you should follow to ensure that your container is serviced properly every time, and to help keep your neighborhood clean and litter free.

- Recycling carts and trash containers (barrels, cans or bags) should be set out by 7 AM on your scheduled collection days. Solid Waste Management often makes route changes to increase efficiency, so make sure your containers are out on time.
- 2 After collection has occurred, your recycling carts and trash containers (barrels or cans) must be **brought back onto your property** and placed out of public view. Containers should <u>not</u> be left in the alley or at the curb on non-collection days.
- 3 Recycling carts and trash containers (barrels, cans or bags) should <u>not</u> be placed out for collection any earlier than the evening before your scheduled collection day.
- 4 Do <u>not</u> block sidewalks, pathways, gates or garages when setting out your containers for collection.
- Please make sure there is at least 4 feet of unobstructed space on each side of your containers. This way the automated collection trucks will have room to safely empty them.

## DPS Students Become Trash Detectives

This summer Denver Recycles received a competitive grant from the Environmental Protection Agency, Region 8 in the amount of \$44,000. These grant funds will be used to assist 12 Denver public schools with educating students, staff and families on how to critically think about waste, and increasing recycling and waste reduction at school through hands-on activities and projects.

To kick things off this Fall, each participating school assisted Denver Recycles staff with a



waste sort where one day's worth of school trash was set aside and documented. Students acted as "Trash Detectives," using their investigative skills to sort, categorize and weigh school trash as a means of identifying where their

schools can make improvements in their recycling efforts.

Next, the students will work with Denver Recycles to start projects aimed at increasing recycling and waste reduction for items such as food scraps, paper towels, milk cartons and classroom paper commonly found in school trash.

The 12 schools participating in this program are: Academy of Urban Learning, Ashley, Centennial, DCIS, Monroe, Montclair, Newlon, Thomas Jefferson, Trevista at Horace Mann, Valdez, University Park and Westerly Creek.

## We Need You for the 2012 Great American Cleanup

Neighborhood Cleanups are critical to ensuring the cleanliness of our City. It's never too early to start planning your 2012 Great American Cleanup project.

Keep Denver Beautiful hosted the Annual Great American Cleanup in 2011 from March through May. **This event attracted more than 6,000 volunteers**, 4,000 of which were Denver Public School students, teachers and school volunteers. ## Electronics Recycling

Denver residents recycled more than 170,000 pounds of televisions, computers, monitors and other electronic devices through the electronics recycling programs offered by Denver Recycles this past year. Denver Recycles partnered with Comcast and Metech Recycling to hold three "Eco-rally Electronics **Recycling Collection Events**" in which more than 960 residents participated. These single day events were held by appointment only and offered residents a significantly discounted rate for recycling electronic materials.



An additional 558 residents used Denver Recycles' "E-cycle coupon" this past year. The E-cycle coupon allows residents to take their electronics directly to Metech's recycling facility and recycle them at a discounted price.

Do you have electronics that need recycling? Take advantage of the E-cycle coupon program by

completing a form online at **DenverGov.org/DenverRecycles** or by calling 311. Also, stay tuned for information on electronics recycling collection events in 2012.

Properly and responsibly recycling electronic equipment is very important. Electronics contain a variety of harmful, and in some cases, even toxic substances, that when discarded can pose risks to our health and the environment. CRT (Cathode Ray Tube) televisions and monitors contain an average of 4 to 8 pounds of

lead each. Flat panel televisions, laptops and monitors have mercury containing lamps inside and electronic circuitry, and some cords and cables contain significant amounts of lead and cadmium.

It's also important to ensure these materials are recycled so that we can reduce our need to mine or extract more of the natural resources used to make electronics.

While there are some valuable materials contained in electronic waste, the cost to dismantle this equipment into the various materials is labor intensive and expensive, especially for televisions and monitors. That is why there is a recycling charge when electronics are recycled. The City partners with Metech Recycling, a certified e-Steward, to ensure your electronics are recycled responsibly. 
#### **Service notes:**

- **Dumpster** service customers should place their Christmas tree out for recycling on either Tuesday, January 3<sup>rd</sup> or Monday, January 9<sup>th</sup> for collection during that week.
- ► Barrel and Manual service customers should place their

Christmas tree out for recycling on their normal trash days between January 3rd and 13th.

Do <u>not</u> place trees in dumpsters. Trees should be placed at least 4 feet away from dumpsters.

Municipal Services

Denver Solid Waste Management is proud of the services we provide. In addition to servicing more than 172,000 residential homes for trash, recycling and limited composting, Solid Waste Managment also services more than 143 Denver Public Schools and facilities, and more than 180 City & County of Denver municipal facilities including fire stations, police stations, recreation centers and library branches. So, the next time you're at a City facility looking to recycle something, check around for a recycling bin. If you don't see one, be sure to ask someone where you can recycle.

## Recycle These Materials In Your Purple Cart



#### **Corrugated Cardboard**

- Flatten & cut cardboard into pieces no larger than 2 ft. x 2 ft.
- Only broken down boxes inside the cart will be collected for recycling
- No wax coated cardboard



**Steel Cans & Aerosol Cans** 

Aerosol cans must be empty



Aluminum Cans, Foil & Pie Plates

Remove as much food residue as possible



#### **Paperboard**

(cereal boxes, paper towel rolls, paper egg cartons, etc.)

- Remove plastic bags and film
- No foil coated containers or paper cups



Newspaper, Magazines & Catalogs

Remove plastic bags



Phone Books

Remove bags and magnets



#### **Glass Bottles & Jars**

- Section Food and beverage glass only
- Remove all lids, caps and corks
- Large metal lids can be recycled, but must be removed



#### **Office Paper & Junk Mail**

Limit shredded paper. Place all shredded paper in a closed paper bag and mark bag as shredded paper.



#### **Paper Bags**

- Remove food wrappings and food
- No plastic bags
- No microwave popcorn bags

## UNACCEPTABLE MATERIAL

## Don't put these items in your recycling cart:

- NO Garbage
- **NO** Plastic Bags
- **NO** Toys
- NO Plastic Tubes
- NO Styrofoam® of any kind
- NO Plastic Shrink Wrap
- NO Paper Cups or Plates
- NO Bubble Wrap or Envelopes with Bubble Wrap Inside
- NO Ceramics or Drink Glasses
- NO Candy or Food Wrappers
- NO Plastic like containers marked as "Compostable," "PLA" or "made from plant based materials"

Any items listed above or other items not on the acceptable materials list have the potential to ruin an entire load of recyclables. Please read the accepted items list carefully before putting items in your recycling cart.

## Safety in Our Neighborhoods

Safety is a responsibility that Denver Solid Waste Management takes very seriously. In fact, **trash and recycling collectors have the 7th highest job-related fatality rate** in the United States. So help us prevent injury and property damage by always playing it safe around our collection trucks and being careful about what you put in your trash.

#### **DRIVING**

Solid Waste Management employees drive more than a million miles a year through Denver neighborhoods. We provide extensive safety training to our employees, but when we're in your neighborhood we need your help. When you see a trash truck, or other large vehicle, remember to **slow down, stay back, watch for signals and proceed with caution**. This will help to ensure that we see you and that everyone has time to react appropriately should it be necessary.

#### **CAUTION - SHOULD IT GO IN THE TRASH?**

Denver Solid Waste Management employees pick up about 400 million pounds of bagged trash each year and way too often they come across hazards that can be very dangerous. Please be careful and thoughtful about what you put in your trash bag, and use alternative disposal options for some dangerous household items such as:

- 1. Compact Fluorescent Bulbs (CFLs): It is important to dispose of fluorescent bulbs properly. Not only is the glass sharp and can poke out of trash bags, but these bulbs also contain mercury that is hazardous when inhaled or touched. Instead of disposing of CFLs in your trash, recycle them for free at hardware stores such as Home Depot, Lowes or Ace Hardware.
- 2. Needles: Needles or "sharps" should never be placed in trash bags, trash containers or recycling carts. Instead, needles and sharps should be placed in specially designed medical containers and sent to licensed medical waste companies for disposal. For information about proper disposal visit CDPHE online at CPDHE.state.co.us/hm/hhw/howto/needles2.htm.
- 3. Hazardous Waste: Never put hazardous waste in your trash; it is hazardous to Solid Waste operators and the environment. Instead, take advantage of the City's low cost Household Hazardous Waste Disposal program and material-specific drop sites around the city. For more information visit DenverGov.org/DenverRecycles.
- 4. Old Electronics: Electronics contain a number of harmful substances, and many contain sharp glass and metals that when set out in the trash present a risk to our operators, your neighbors and the environment. Consider using our E-cycle coupon or collection events to safely recycle your old electronics.

Learn Where to Recycle Just About Anything!

Sure you can recycle paper, bottles, cans and a whole lot more (see *Recycle These Materials in Your Purple Cart* on page 9) with Denver Recycles, but recycling in our city goes beyond what you can put in your purple cart. In fact, Denver is lucky to have many great retailers, non-profits and companies that allow the public to drop off a variety of items at their locations for reuse, recycling or composting.

To help you easily locate these organizations, Denver Recycles maintains a **Recycling Directory** which contains drop site listings for more than 100 different categories of materials from the very common, such as latex paint, and construction and building materials, down to the unusual, such as wine corks and hearing aids.

So the next time you find yourself with old metal hangers, CD cases or foam packaging peanuts that you can't put in your Denver Recycles cart, don't assume they are trash because there actually could be a drop site near you that will accept

## Make Leaf Recycling in Denver a Success

Participation in the LeafDrop program continues to grow each year and Solid Waste Management would like to see that trend continue. To ensure that we maximize the amount of leaves collected and composted while also minimizing the City's costs and use of resources, it is critical for participants to follow our guidelines.

Please only bring leaves to drop sites during specified dates and times. **Dropping off leaves during other times is considered illegal dumping**. The City sets specific dates and times for weekend LeafDrop sites so that

we can ensure we have adequate staff and resources on site to properly collect, prepare and transport leaves for composting. Illegally dumped leaves do not get recycled.

Leaves should never be blown or swept from your yard into the street. Street sweepers are not designed to pick up large quantities of leaves, and those that do get picked up are mixed in with street litter so they are too contaminated to compost. Leaf piles in the street or curb can also clog storm sewers and lead to storm drain issues in your neighborhood.
